When you hear the word *organic*, what does it mean to you? Holden Grange is hosting a public informational session, ‘The Meaning of USDA Organic,’ on Monday, August 8th at the Holden Senior Center, 1130 Main St., at 7:00 p.m. All are welcome to attend to learn more about the United States Dept. of Agriculture’s standards necessary for food to be certified as organic.

The guest speaker, Al Johnson, currently holds several leadership positions for the National Organic Farmers Association (NOFA) and its New Jersey chapter. Using organic practices, he was a farmer and a market gardener for twelve years and has been an inspector of organic farms and food processing plants for three decades. The original organic certification standards for New Jersey were written around his kitchen table. Johnson served on the Standards/Policy Boards for several organic certification agencies over a span of thirty years. He still is an avid organic gardener and teaches workshops throughout the northeast.

From the Veterans Committee

George Washington's words, "Let it be known that he who wears the military order of the purple heart has given of his blood in the defense of his homeland and shall forever be revered by his fellow countrymen," described the Badge of Military Merit he created on August 7, 1782. It was only awarded to a few soldiers at the time. Soon after, awarding this prestigious honor went dormant until it was reinstated on February 22, 1932, Washington's 200th birthday. Since 2014, National Purple Heart Day on August 7th annually honors all who were awarded this distinction.



The color purple was fittingly chosen for the medal as it stands for courage and bravery. The Purple Heart is awarded in the name of the President to those wounded or killed while serving in the U. S. military from April 5, 1917 until the present.

Let us pause on August 7th to reflect on the bravery of the estimated 1.8 million to have received the Purple Heart. As Americans, we are grateful for our freedoms as a result of their sacrifice.

OUTDOOR ALMANAC

2

Many moths and butterfly species hatch a second brood this month, so it's a great time to investigate plants and tree leaves for **caterpillars** and appreciate the amazing variety of protective camouflage. Some look like bird droppings, some like leaves or twigs, and some have large eye spots at the end of their abdomens to confuse predators trying to aim for their heads.



4

After dark, look for large, light-green Luna Moths near porch lights; this adult phase only lasts for a week.

5

A few days after a rain look for ghost pipe plants blooming among the roots of trees in the forest. These small, colorless, flowering plants have no chlorophyll and get their nutrients from the fungi that live in tree roots.

7

Listen for the trills or whinnies of **Eastern Screech-owls** calling as the young of the year search for territories.



10

Flocks of sanderlings, returned from breeding grounds in the Arctic, can be seen chasing waves as they feed on tiny crustaceans in the wet sand.

11

Full moon



13

Peak of the Perseid meteor shower, which can be seen from July 14 to August 24. After midnight, shooting stars, as many as 100 per hour, flare through the darkened sky.

15

Monarch butterflies are toxic to birds, and their orange and black coloring serves as a warning to any that have tried to eat one. Check out all the other orange and black insects on milkweeds. Most of them are not toxic, but birds that have eaten a monarch are inclined to avoid all similarly colored insects.

17

Tall, bright red **cardinal flowers** blooming in clean freshwater wetlands are an important late-season nectar source for Ruby-throated Hummingbirds as they prepare to migrate

Unlike most moths, the beautiful clearwing moths are diurnal (daytime feeders) and look more like small hummingbirds or large bumblebees as they fly from flower to flower. Hummingbird Clearwing has pale legs and Snowberry Clearwing has a black band from the eye across the thorax and black legs; they both have two-toned abdomens and see-through wings.


Garter snakes are hatching. These snakes are ovoviviparous, which means the females make eggs but hold them in their bodies until the young hatch, and then release them. A good adaptation for a reptile in a colder climate that can't dig an incubation nest.

25

Common Nighthawks are migrating along the river valleys. Search above open fields near water and listen for their raspy peent calls as they hunt night-flying insects.

On rainy days in wooded areas, look for **Red Efts** (juvenile newts) on roots and rocks.


Watch for flocks of migrating shorebirds in muddy estuaries, along the coast or in open fields. Most of these birds breed in the Arctic and spend winters in Central and South America. Adults come through first, followed by this year's juveniles.

31

Solomon's seal fruits hanging under the plant's curving stem have ripened to a deep blue-black. Clusters of ripened red false Solomon's seal fruits hang from the ends of the stems.

ACCOMMODATIONS

Make your reservations directly with Log Cabin Resort & Campground by calling Lisa at (906) 586-9732 or (785) 633-3783. Tell her you're coming to Grange Revival. Reservations may be made starting July 23, 2021. Payment for lodging will be accepted starting January 2023 and can cancel prior to payment at no cost. There is no per-person rate for your stay.

There are a dozen cabins on the property that house between 2 and 8 adults. Rates are locked for Grange Revival participants at the 2021 price to ensure great savings. Cabins include linens. Several have full kitchens. Call or visit uplogcabin.com for details.

There are also nearly 60 RV sites available with rates between \$30-\$45 per night depending on amenities. Some sites will accommodate two RVs and all sites can accommodate tents. Dry campsites are available and the property includes several restrooms and showers as well as laundry facilities.

The entire property allows friendly, leashed pets with well-behaved owners who will pick up after them. Pets may stay in cabins for an extra \$10/pet/night fee.

There are also three major hotels about 15 miles from the campground, located in Newberry. These are the Quality Inn and Suites, America's Best Value Inn, and Pleasant Moose Lodge. Room blocks may be established closer to the date of Grange Revival. Those registered or pre-registered will receive details by email.

ABOUT THE PROPERTY AND THE SURROUNDING AREA

Play on the basketball or volleyball courts and take your turn at a toss on the horseshoe pit. Bring your bike or ATV and take a ride. A toddler playground provides even the youngest guests an area to play. There is enough room to enjoy lawn games, so sharpen your cornhole skills, or bring your kite. There is a sandy beach with a long shallow area. You can bring your own boat and put in at the on-property slip or rent kayaks, boats or pontoons once you get there. There is a fish-cleaning building, so bring your rods and tackle boxes. The camp store has various supplies including ice and wood for campfires. A large pavilion and indoor community room will serve as gathering places for Revival attendees. And yes, wi-fi is available free throughout the property.

Based on our 2021 numbers, we will be the only group on the property during our event.

Nearby you will find a variety of attractions including Fayette Historic State Park and Ghost Town, Lake Superior shipwreck tours on glass-bottom boats, rivers, waterfalls, nearby Lake Michigan and so much more.
